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

In June, we featured the Fifth Freedom collection in New York Historic Newspapers. This collection was recently added to <u>New York Heritage</u> for easy perusal so we're spotlighting it again! The Fifth Freedom was a periodic free newspaper of the Mattachine Society of the Niagara Frontier, Western New York's most prominent early gay rights organization. In being the official written mouthpiece of the region's first systematic gay rights organization, The Fifth Freedom expresses the earliest codified and widely distributed literature of the gay community within the region. identified group in the years that followed the Stonewall riots and preceded the onset of the more well-known AIDS epidemic, but also upon the larger Western New York and American culture overall. The newspaper content as well as editorial direction both chronicle and critique a unique time in both American and world-wide history, as seen and expressed by an active, though underdocumented, population. This is a nearly complete collection, covering most of Fifth Freedom's publication run from 1970 to 1983.
